JAMES 1:23

23 For if any be a hearer of the word, and not a doer, he is like unto a man beholding his natural face in a glass:

JAMES 1:24

24 For he beholdeth himself, and goeth his way, and straightway forgetteth what manner of man he was.

JAMES 1:25

25 But whoso looketh into the perfect law of liberty, and continueth therein, he being not a forgetful hearer, but a doer of the work, this man shall be blessed in his deed.

26 If any man among you seem to be religious, and bridleth not his tongue, but deceiveth his own heart, this man's religion is vain.

JAMES 1:26

26 If any man among you seem to be ***RELIGIOUS**, and ***BRIDLETH** not his tongue, but deceiveth his own heart, this man's religion is vain.

RELIGIOUS: threskos {thrace'-kos} Fearing or worshipping God; religious

The word religious (threskos) means "given to religious observances." In this context it refers to attendance at worship services and to other observances of religion, such as prayer, almsgiving, and fasting.

BRIDLETH: chalinagogeo {khal-in-ag-ogue-eh'-o} to lead by a bridle, to guide; to bridle, hold in check, restrain

PSALM 39:1

1 ¶ To the chief Musician, even to Jeduthun, A Psalm of David. I said, I will take heed to my ways, that I sin not with my tongue: I will keep my mouth with a bridle, while the wicked is before me.

JAMES 1:26

26 If any man among you seem to be religious, and bridleth not his tongue, but deceiveth his own heart, this man's religion is vain.

JAMES 3:5

5 Even so the tongue is a little member, and boasteth great things. Behold, how great a matter a little fire kindleth!

JAMES 3:6

6 And the tongue is a fire, a world of iniquity: so is the tongue among our members, that it defileth the whole body, and setteth on fire the course of nature; and it is set on fire of hell.
