ACTS 28:11

And after three months we departed in a ship of Alexandria, which had wintered in the isle, whose sign was Castor and Pollux.

The Greek word dioskouroi (sons of Zeus) refers to Castor and Pollux, who were the twin sons of Leda and the Greek god Zeus.

After their death, they are fabled to have been translated to heaven, and made constellations under the name of gemini, or the twins.

They then received divine honours, and were called the sons of Jupiter. They were supposed to preside over sailors, and to be their protectors; hence it was not uncommon to place their image on ships.

Sailors regarded these two brothers as patron deities who would protect them from the dangers of the sea.

They were supposed to have a power of saving men in danger at sea:

The figure that was used for Castor and Pollux, was that of two young men on horseback, with each a javelin in his hand, and by their side half an egg and a star;

but the sign of Castor and Pollux was that of a double cross. When these two appeared together,

they were looked upon, by the superstitious Heathen, as prosperous to sailors, and therefore for a good omen,
